

Fr. Brian McDermott, SJ, has been a member of the Maryland Province of the Society of Jesus for sixty years. He is currently a special assistant to the President of Georgetown University. At Georgetown, he has taught theology courses in the Catholic Studies Program, and engages in spiritual direction and trains individuals to give the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Loyola and to become spiritual directors. His teaching and writing interests are in the areas of the theological interpretation of Jesus Christ, the theology of the human person, Jesuit

spirituality, and authority, leadership and spirituality.



Martina O'Shea is Pastoral Associate for Ignatian Spirituality and Prayer at Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Washington, D.C. For the past ten years, Martina has been responsible for creating and directing a sustainable and comprehensive, parish-wide program in Ignatian spirituality that is based on the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius.
